### Fire, Fire in Newtown!!!

On Tuesday, January 20, 1846 about seven o'clock in the morning a frame dwelling house in Newtown, occupied by Garret Krewson was discovered to be on fire and in a short time with its contents was burned to the ground. It caught fire from the chimney in the upper story. The well known liberality of the citizens of the place, immediately made up the loss in the occupant, who is a laboring man and of course would be left in a destitute condition from the effects of the fire.
