
Hicks Walking Tour

The Newtown Railroad Revisited (Parts 1 & 2)



The March meeting of the Newtown Historic Association was held on Monday, March 19th at the Half-Moon (Court) Inn. The program featured a lecture entitled, "*The Newtown Railroad Revisited*" that was presented by Richard N. Mansley. Due the overwhelming interest and positive response, the lecture was divided into two parts, the second of which was presented on Monday, March 26th.

Those in attendance were taken on a virtual tour of the Philadelphia, Newtown & New York Railroad as told in over 100 architectural, mechanical and civil engineering drawings from 2nd and Erie Avenue, Philadelphia to Newtown, including two connecting branches. The tour was arranged in chronological order from the Victorian Era of 1876 to the modern times of 1976.

Mr. Mansley has spent over 47 years researching and replicating the signs, stations and structures along the Philadelphia, Newtown & New York Railroad. His background as a mechanical draftsman was put to good use, as over the years he has completed over 100 scaled drawings (blueprints actually), each of which took an average of over 100 hours to complete, and are literally beautiful works of art. In order to gain the information necessary to begin each drawing, Mr. Mansley traveled the line, sometimes visiting the final resting places of the long abandoned train station buildings in swamps and fields, to intricately measure each structure for his notes. The results of Mr. Mansley's extensive research can be found in the archives of the Newtown Historic Association. Mr. Mansley has donated 14 volumes of his research entitled, *"The Newtown Railroad Reel: A Chronicle of the Philadelphia, Newtown & New York Railroad"* compiled and edited by Richard N. Mansley, 1873-1929. Mr. Mansley compiled the 14-volume history of the Newtown Branch of the Railroad by combing through numerous newspapers, periodicals and printed resources. His extensive history is definitive in the sense that it tells the story of the Newtown Branch of the Railroad as it unfolded. Interspersed into the facts are his many intricately scaled drawings and other images that help tell this fascinating story.

The Newtown Railroad station stood on Lincoln Avenue in Newtown from 1878 until 1967, when the New Hope and Ivyland Railroad made a disastrous attempt to move the station to Buckingham. However, the job proved to be beyond their capabilities and the project was abandoned.

At the conclusion of the second part of his lecture, Mr. Mansley was presented with a limited edition print of the Newtown Station that was donated by the well-known local artist, Craig Hackett.

The Train Keeps a Rollin'... Spending a Day with George M. Hart

Newtown Historic Association members David Callahan, Frank Fabian and Brian Rounsavill had the good fortune to spend a beautiful spring day recently with former Newtown resident, George M. Hart. Renown as the founding Director of the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania and a railroad historian of the first magnitude, George Hart amassed a lifetime collection of negatives, photographs and artifacts with an emphasis on Pennsylvania's railroads.

Born in Doylestown, Hart was educated at Buckingham Friends School and the George School, graduating in 1937. He has worn a myriad of hats including that of historian, educator, museum director, short line railroad executive, and railroader over many years. He has memories of boyhood hours spent at the Reading Company depot in his hometown of Dovlestown, Pa., watching tenwheel Camelbacks being reversed on the turntable.

After auditing classes at University of Pennsylvania and briefly teaching history as a member of the George School History Department, he became Assistant Business Manager and Treasurer at his alma mater, George School, in 1941. He held this position for twenty-three years. The school adjoined the Reading's Newtown branch, which afforded Hart numerous opportunities to further his interest in railroad history and train photography.

In 1941, he helped compile through exhaustive research the fiftieth anniversary History of George School, published in 1943. During his years in Newtown, he was an active volunteer fireman in the Newtown Fire Company (1952-1964). Here, he befriended Joseph Schmitt, the Reading Company agent at the George School station and the two struck up a lifelong friendship. Hart often photographed the endless parade of freight and passenger trains on the Newtown Line, which skirted the school property, from 1933 until 1938, and again from 1941 until 1964. Scores of these postcard-size images are in the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania archives.

In 1964, Hart removed from Newtown and founded Rail Tours, Inc. which operated weekend steampowered excursions on leased portions of the Maryland & Pennsylvania Railroad. In 1969, Hart was appointed as the Director of the first stateoperated railroad museum in the United States, the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania in Strasburg, Pa. Following his departure as Director Emeritus from the Railroad Museum in 1983, George continued his railroading interests as President and General Manager of the Stewartstown Railroad, a quaint 7mile short line in York County, Pa. which hauled freight and passengers. Today, he still serves in this capacity. At age 88, he recently ended his program of Rail Tours weekend train excursions out of Jim Thorpe, Pa. since 1971.

In addition to railroad history, George's many interests have included collecting historic Willys-Knight automobiles, covered bridges, canals, photography, reading old newspaper files, weather forecasting, land conservation, firefighting and restoring old houses. A first-rate scholar, George has a remarkable encyclopedic memory of all things railroad, and has done much in the way of documenting the illustrious heritage of the railroads of Pennsylvania. His lifelong devotion to the cause of railroad history and preservation in the United States is immeasurable. We are all richer for his efforts.

Half Moon Inn Sign

On March 2nd, as the focal point of AHA Friday, the Court Inn was officially rededicated, returning to its original name, the Half-Moon Inn. A citation from Rep. David Steil's office was read and presented by the Mayor. The new "Half Moon Inn" sign that now stands on Court Street was re-created by Rosemary Tottoroto and the beautiful iron work was fabricated by Ray Mathis. The Inn was originally named the Half-Moon Inn after it was built in 1733, and it appears as such on the National Register of Historic Places. However, since the County Court was situated across the street where the Gap now stands, the Inn gradually became known as the Court Inn (or, the Inn across from the Court), for which it became more commonly known.
