Thornton/Hicks House Update



In 1998, the Newtown Historic Association purchased the Thornton/Hicks property immediately adjacent to the Half Moon Inn, which was owned by Ms. Grace Lauer. Ms. Lauer has life rights to live in the house after which the NHA will take possession of the property and plans to use it to accommodate the expansion of our research facilities and enhance the operations of the association.

In 2002, the Thornton\Hicks House was renovated with the help of a Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission grant and in-kind donations. This project was the initial step in stabilizing, repairing and restoring the roof, chimney, upper front wall, and attic of this property for later use.

In April, a serious structural problem was discovered on the first floor and a proxy vote of our membership was conducted to approve the funds necessary to remedy the situation. Due to the emergency nature of the problem, and their prior experience with the Thornton/Hicks House, we have engaged the services of Twining Construction to address the problem as cost-effectively and efficiently as possible over the summer months.

Although the total cost of this work will be offset in full by gifts that will be received in the coming months, we felt that it was necessary to bring this issue to the attention of the membership. The Newtown Historic Association had planned to renovate the Thornton/Hicks House once we took full possession of the property. The recently discovered structural issues require immediate action, but would have been necessary at some point in the near future.

Eagle Scout Project


In May, Josh Lepine, member of Newtown Troop #380, completed his Eagle Scout project. Josh's project involved helping the Newtown Historic Association restore the barn located behind the Half Moon Inn and Thornton/Hicks House.

This project included several phases such as, digging out the dirt floor in the third bay of the barn and replacing it with crushed stone, re-landscaping an adjacent area with the displaced dirt, and repairing and painting the old barn.

This Eagle Scout project was a great way for the Newtown Historic Association, with the generous and able assistance of Troop #380, to help revitalize an historic structure in Newtown Borough. We would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Josh on a job well-done and express our most sincere thanks to the other members of his troop who helped with the completion of this project.

The Newtown Heritage Walk Project

In May, both the Borough and Township approved the Newtown Historic Association's Heritage Walk project. The Newtown Heritage Walk project will be a self-guided walking tour consisting of over twenty stops in Newtown Borough and Newtown Township. An 18" x 24" sign will be installed at each stop that will consist of a blend of text and photos (*see below*).

The Heritage Walk will integrate historically significant sites along State Street (Borough) and Sycamore Street (Township). Each stop has been selected because of its historical value to the Newtown community, featuring sites from the 18th, 19th and 20th centuries. The Heritage Walk is modeled after similar programs in Gettysburg, Harrisburg, Carlisle, the Delaware Canal, and other historic locations in Pennsylvania.

The Newtown Historic Association is coordinating all aspects of the project, including: selecting the sites, developing the signs and brochures, obtaining the necessary HARB, Borough and Township approvals, confirming site sponsors, and coordinating the installation and launch of the Heritage Walk program.

All site selections are made by a committee consisting of representatives from the Newtown Historic Association, the Borough of Newtown and Newtown Township. The general site selection criteria are:

1. <u>Historical Significance</u> – Sites must be considered historic, preferably have been built in either the 1700s or early 1800s, and have contributed to the historical character and/or cultural development of the

Newtown community (Borough & Township).

- 2. <u>Location</u> Sites must be located on either State Street (Borough) or Sycamore Street (Township), or within a one- or two-block radius, to maintain the contiguous flow of an historic walking tour of the downtown Newtown community.
- 3. <u>Architectural Merit</u> Sites must exemplify, embody or exhibit the unique architectural, construction and design features that have come to define the Newtown (Bucks County) community.
- 4. <u>Sponsorship</u> Sites must be funded by a sponsor(s) to help cover the fixed costs of the site marker, brochure and marker installation. Newtown Township will install the signs along Sycamore Street.
- 5. <u>Total Number</u> Every effort will be made to be judicious and equitable during the site selection process, so as to place a practical and reasonable limit on the total number of signs and not to overly "clutter" the streets of Newtown.
