The November meeting will be held on Monday, November 19th at 8:00 PM at the Half-Moon Inn. "Divining Old Houses" will be presented by Kathy Auerbach, a noted preservation consultant, who will present clues to understanding the construction, age and history of old houses in Bucks County. Ms. Auerbach consults with the **Institute for Community** Preservation on historic bridge issues and specializes in architectural analysis and historical research. She has led Bucks County community College students to receive Honorable Mention (1997), 3rd Place (2003) & 4th Place (2005) Peterson Prizes and is currently directing Historic American Building Survey documentation for the National Park Service. Thornton/Hicks House Update



As noted in the June 2007 *Half-Moon*, a serious structural problem was discovered on the first floor of the Thornton/Hicks House. Accordingly, a proxy vote of our membership was conducted in April to approve the funds necessary to remedy the situation.

We had planned to renovate the Thornton/Hicks House once we took full possession of the property; however, the recently discovered structural issues required immediate action, but they would have been necessary at some point in the near future. Due to the emergency nature of the problem, and their prior experience with the Thornton/Hicks House, we engaged the services of Twining Construction to address the problem as cost-effectively and efficiently as possible over the summer months.

We are pleased to report that, through the prudent project management by our Buildings & Grounds Committee, in particular David Callahan, the total cost of the project came in at \$69,824, which was approximately one-third less than anticipated. Although the total cost of this work will be offset in full by gifts that will be received in the coming months, we felt that it was necessary to update the membership on this important project.

Boone Garden Project



Work continues on the Boone Garden restoration project. The Newtown Historic Association has enlisted the help of a second Eagle Scout, Chris Ruth, member of Newtown Troop #29.

Chris has been working toward completing his Eagle Scout project, which involved clearing the area where the new fence will be installed, regrading the center of the lot and helping erect the wooden fence, modeled after the fence at Carpenter's Hall in Philadelphia, between the Grotto property and the Boone Garden.



The October meeting of the Newtown Historic Association was held on Monday, October 15th at the Court Inn. About 40 people attended the lecture entitled, "Civilians in the Civil War" by Paula Gidjunis, a noted Civil War historian, that explained the roles and functions that civilians performed during the Civil War. The focus of the talk was on detailing the occupations, services, and other duties that civilians carried out during the Civil War. In addition, the lecture explored the impact that the Civil War had on the lives of civilians. Specifically, details were shared on how civilians coped with the destruction of Civil War and its aftermath. The use of primary sources such as diaries and letters helped tell the story of the Civil War participants. Those in attendance really enjoyed the informative lecture and light refreshments.
