## 2016-2017 Education Committee Report

The Newtown Historic Association coordinated the following educational lectures and special educational events this year:

- April 18, 2016 "Treasures from the Attic" with interesting pieces from the NHA collection displayed and discussed (Annual Meeting)
- May 7, 2016 "Walking Tour of George School" led by David B. Long, Archivist of George School. About 60 people attended touring the Quaker Meeting building, Mollie Dodd Library, the new Gym, and the site of the George School Train Station (General Membership Meeting)
- June 1, 2016 Fifth Grade Walking Tour of Newtown coordinated by Peg Walker. Over 600 students, teachers and parents from Goodnoe Elementary, Newtown Elementary, St. Andrew Grade School and Albert the Great School of Huntingdon Valley participated in a tour of 10 historic sites in Newtown, including the Half Moon Inn.
- June 26, 2016 "Bike tour of Newtown and George School" led by past President of the NHA Paul Gouza. The tour stopped at 4 historic sites in Newtown, then on to George School where member Jim Garner led the group. About 25 "bikers" attended.
- October 1, 2016 Market Day Artisan and Craft Fair with plenty of educational opportunities, open hearth cooking, woodworking, blacksmithing, chair caning, rug hooking, candle dipping and the favorite re-enactor's encampment and firing of the muskets.
- October 15, 2016 "Antique Appraisal" hosted by the NHA in partnership with Johnson, Kendall & Johnson Inc. at the Half Moon Inn. Member Cindy Stephenson, Paula Fox and Tom Wakely all of Stephenson's Auction House in Southampton gave appraisals of a great variety of objects that people bought in. A very interesting event.
- November 14, 2016 "Grand Forage 1778 The Revolutionary War's Forgotten Campaign" presented by Todd W. Braisted, past president of the Bergen County Historical Society, an honorary vice president of the United Empire Loyalist Association of Canada, and a Fellow of the Company of Military Historians. - December 2, 2016 "Charles Dickens: A Christmas Carol" presented by Alisa Dupuy of the Ladies of History Historical Productions.
- December 3, 2016 "Holiday Open House Tour" A tour of thirteen historic homes and public buildings decorated for the holiday season.
- February 11, 2017 "George and Martha: A Love Story" presented by member Alisa Dupuy of The Ladies of History Historical Productions. (General Membership Meeting)

• March 21, 2017 – "Morell Smith Revisited" presented by Jon Guy, retired Army Reserve Officer and past Commander of Post 440, at the American Legion Post 440 to a full house of attendees. (General Membership Meeting

### 2016-2017 Research Center Report

Edward R. Barnsley Room of Newtown History

The Edward R. Barnsley Room of Newtown History or Research Center continues to be open to the public on Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and on Thursday evenings from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. In the last year, almost 1,700 people called or visited the Court Inn and Research Center, primarily for tours and research. Over 54 people visited the Research Library to research Newtown history, genealogy and properties.

The main emphasis of our work in the Research Library continues to be updating our computer catalogue with information from new accessions and with data from items in the collection that have not been previously catalogued. From April 1, 2016 to March 31, 2017, we processed 45 gifts and a total of over 701 new items were added to the collection. In addition, the computer entries of approximately 1,102 items already in the computer were updated to complete the entries. As of the end of March, our computer inventory included 16,992 photographs, 1,701 books, 3,764 objects and 18,560 archival items for a total of 41,017 items. This total reflects an increase of 1,803 items over last year.

In the past year, fifteen volunteers have worked over 2,000 hours in the Research Center. Our very able researchers, David Callahan, Rick Speranza and Jeffery Marshall have been busy helping the public. Kathleen Gonsalves, Leigh Clark and Paul Gouza worked processing larger accessions. Bik Remmey continues to scan copies of the Advance into the computer so that they can be easily researched. In addition to aiding people who come for research, Richard Mansley continues to be in charge of all accessions and processing archival items and this year he was joined by Mary Beth Palestini. Sarajane Dallas works to update the obituary file. Rebecca Woodward and Richard Vitti are working on reorganizing the vertical files. Rebecca is concentrating on the Newtown schools files. Rick Speranza, Paul Gouza and David Callahan continue to work on reorganizing the attic and on cleaning, cataloging and storing the items found in the attic. Harriet Beckert accessions objects and photographs and deals with problem areas. Rick Speranza has taken over most of the computer responsibilities. In addition we had two high school volunteers, Durga Ramachandran and Andrew Xie, who worked on reorganizing the photograph files.

### 2016-2017 Publication & Technology Committee Report

The Publications Committee is charged with maintaining and updating the Newtown Historic Association's print and electronic publications. The Publications Committee is pleased to report that several projects were undertaken this year.

Web – The NHA website www.newtownhistoric.org continues to be updated on a regular basis and serves as a repository for information related to the NHA and events. We also now have internet service at the Court Inn installed by one of our NHA members, Brian Titus.

We now have a page on "Facebook" maintained by Rick Speranza, one of our research center volunteers – who posts interesting pictures and articles from the past and also publicizes upcoming events.

Newsletter – The "Half Moon" newsletter is published quarterly in the spring, summer, fall and winter. The newsletter typically highlights events sponsored by the NHA, as well as listing new members, corporate members, recent acquisitions by the archives, articles for sale, as well as feature articles of interest to the Newtown community. Ideas for future articles are always welcome.

Past & Present Book – The "Newtown: Past & Present" book continues to be a steady seller, with approximately 50 copies remaining of the initial pressrun of 2,000 copies. The book consists of 81 historic photos rephotographed and presented side-by-side to highlight the evolution of Newtown. Photographed and written by Brian Rounsavill, with contributing editors David Callahan and Paul Gouza, the book is 168 pages, with a hard-bound cover, in an oversized coffee table style format. The cover price is \$39.99, plus tax. To date, we have almost sold out our supply of these books and have made over \$80,000 through this project.

Newtown Heritage Walk – Although it is not a true publication, the Newtown Heritage Walk is a visual display of Newtown's history for the public to enjoy. The Newtown Heritage Walk is a self-guided walking tour consisting of thirty-four wayside panels in Newtown Borough and Newtown Township that integrates historically significant sites along State Street (Borough) and Sycamore Street (Township). An 18" x 24" wayside sign has been installed at each stop that consists of a blend of text and photos. Each stop has been selected because of its historical value to the Newtown community, featuring sites from the 18<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries. The Heritage Walk is modeled after similar programs in Gettysburg, Harrisburg, Carlisle, the Delaware Canal, and other historic locations in Pennsylvania. We continue to receive many positive comments about the Newtown Heritage Walk waysides.

Limited Edition Postcard Series – In response to community demand, we produced a limited edition series of thirteen postcards. A mix of old and new photos were chosen from "Newtown: Past & Present" that represent the main attractions in town. Postcards were sold to individual businesses and are also for sale at the Half Moon Inn.

## 2016-2017 Market Day Report

Our 40<sup>th</sup> annual Market Day was scheduled for Saturday, October 1st. The Library 5K was held in the morning with the race ending at the Library on Centre Avenue and McCaffrey's serving breakfast. The weather was wet with showers off and on. There was a good turnout for both events and much support from the community despite the poor weather.

Market Day continued some past traditions and added some new ones for the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Among the Highlights for 2016 were:

- For this special anniversary year, Sponsorships were sold by Lisa Kruse of Angelmark Associates. The sponsors underwrote free hayrides, puppet shows, music, balloon artists, goody bags, t-shirts, etc. State Street between Centre and Washington was closed for the sponsor booths. Community Non-Profit organizations were also included for the first time and were on Centre Avenue at State Street.
- The Half Moon Inn was open for tours with the Full Moon musicians providing the entertainment. Connie Unangst demonstrated Open Hearth Cooking while children were busy making scarecrows in the Innkeeper's Room.
- There were approximately 85 crafters signed up this year with over 50 attending.
- Some of the outdoor demonstrations like dressmaking and gunsmithing were cancelled; however, most others were well-received with the First Crossing Volunteers generating large crowds and much interest in their encampment in back of the Half Moon Inn.
- The Penn's Woods Puppeteers performed "*Captain Crook and the MissingTreasure*" and paper pirate hat making was a big hit with young and old alike.
- Shuttle bus service was provided by Pickering Manor Home with transport from the New Life Christian Church.
- The NHA Welcome table was especially busy selling raffle tickets, items de-accessioned from the archives, t-shirts and giving away goody bags from the sponsors. The Green Grocer, managed by Len Frankowiak conducted sales to benefit the NHA.
- Nancy and Frank Steigerwalt managed a very successful raffle. This year's winner of the "Bed and Breakfast in Cape May" gift certificate was Jeannette Rogers (NHA Member).
