The Newtown Historic Association welcomed the Newtown Business Association (NBA) to the Half-moon (Court) Inn for their June business meeting.

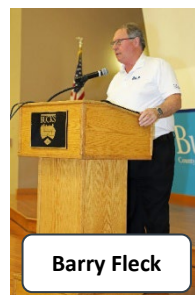

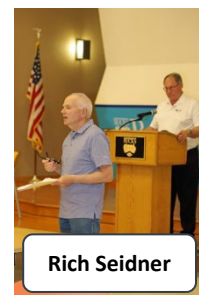
Another Successful Year: April Annual and General Meeting

The NHA annual meeting was presented on Monday, April 17th, 2023, at Bucks County Community College (BCCC). President Barry Fleck covered the normal order of business, which included a summary of the many events that were held over the past year, as well as the presentation and nomination of the Slate of Officers and Directors, which passed unanimously. Treasurer Rich Seidner presented a thorough review of the organization's finances for the past year, for which we are in a strong position. Questions were taken from the audience.

After the annual meeting concluded, individuals moved into the Zlock Performing Arts Center to attend the first-ever joint meeting between the Newtown Historic Association and the Bucks County Community College Foundation. The auditorium was full, as the event was essentially sold out, with over 200 people in attendance. Opening remarks were provided by President Fleck and Andrew States, Assistant Director of Foundation & Alumni Relations from BCCC.

A portrait of George F. Tyler by Yardley artist Chris Monteiro was unveiled at the event. The portrait will hang in Tyler Hall.

The keynote lecture was presented live via videoconference by Daniel Tyler, grandson of George and Stella Tyler. Mr. Tyler is a retired professor of history at Colorado State University and author of "Bucks County's Benevolent Squire: In Search of George Frederick Tyler." He explained how his grandfather and grandmother, Stella Elkins, managed to represent the class of "Perennial Philadelphians" into which they were born, while at the same time, using their talents and inherited wealth to benefit society. The lecture by Mr. Tyler was very informative, covering all aspects of his family and their contributions. Questions were taken from the audience.

The second portion of the lecture was provided by Matthew Metcalf, Coordinator of Historic Preservation at BCCC. Mr. Metcalf provided an informative overview of the architectural history of the Tyler mansion and its construction.

After the architectural portion of the lecture, attendees were directed over to the mansion, where they were given the opportunity to take a private, behind the scenes tour of the Tyler mansion. This special tour included several rooms that are generally off-limits to the public, such as the Pub, George's office, and Stella's bedroom.



Feedback from attendees was extremely positive and the evening provided an opportunity to market the NHA's mission to well over 200 patrons.

Elmer E. Fell, near Taylorsville, and then in the employ of William Church claimed to be the tallest man in Bucks County. He stood about 6 feet 5 inches in his stocking feet. He had a strong competitor in the person of Benjamin Saul, living near Sandford, near Busleton, who was 6 feet 6 inches in height and weighed 260 pounds.

Tribute to Local Veterans

The Newtown Historic Association held its annual Memorial Day tribute to honor local military veterans of World War II, Korea, and Viet Nam on Memorial Day, May 29th, 2023, at the Callahan Research Center.



A collection of over 100 pictures of local soldiers who fought in these wars was created by Mike Donovan, a past NHA member and history buff.



Thanks to the dedication and hard work of Dave Callahan, Kathy Gonsalves and Dave Walton, the new patch collection made its formal debut. The display was comprised of over 300 WWII military shoulder patches from the U.S. Army, Army Air Force, Marines, Navy, and Coast Guard from a variety of battles across

Europe and Asia, with a special focus on 12 Newtown natives and soldiers. Channel 6 (ABC) made a special visit, and the segment was broadcast that same evening.

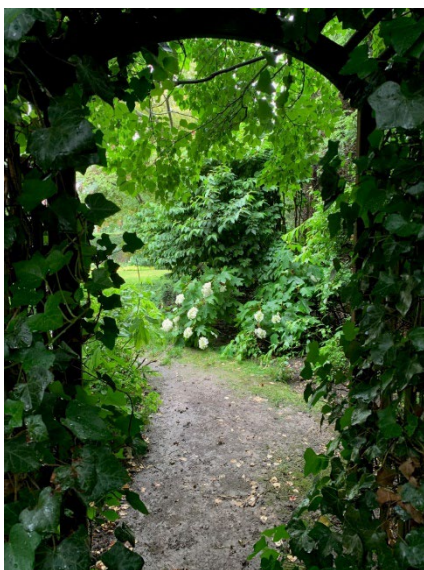
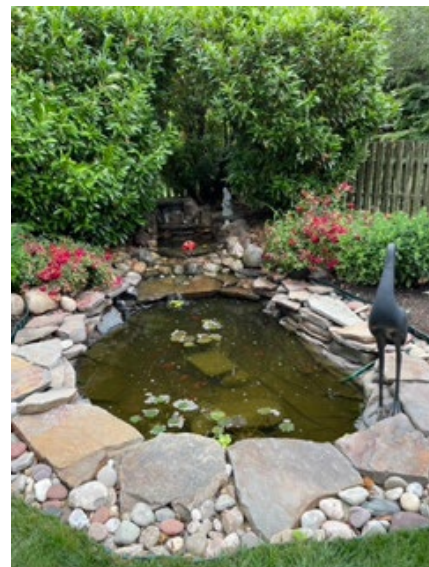
Annual Garden Walk

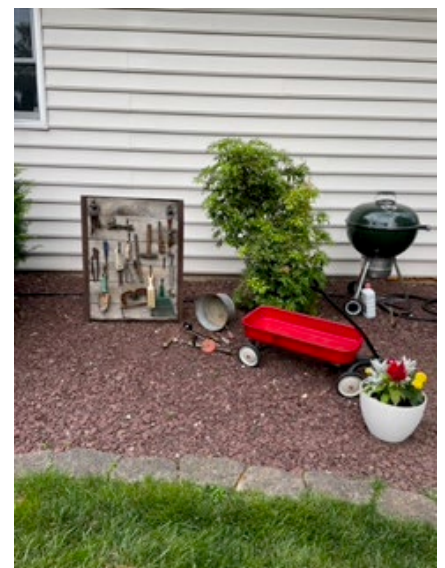
The NHA sponsored its 7th Annual Garden Walk on June 24th, 2023. Refreshments were served at the Half-moon (Court) Inn prior to the walk.

September General Meeting

The September general meeting of the NHA will be held on **Monday, September 18th, 2023, at 7:30 p.m. at the Half-moon (Court) Inn.** Mike Sellers will present, "The History of and Future Plans for the Newtown Trolley Bridge."

The Newtown Trolley Bridge over Newtown Creek was completed in late 1896 by the Newtown Electric Street Railway Company, and an electric trolley line operated from 1897 to 1923. At the turn of the century, hourly trolley service was offered to Doylestown, Langhorne, Bristol, and Trenton via Yardley. With railroad connections, one could reach New York in just over 2 hours. The Newtown trolley entered the Borough on South Lincoln Avenue, turned west on Penn Street, and then north on State Street, where it traveled over the Newtown Creek and on to Doylestown.

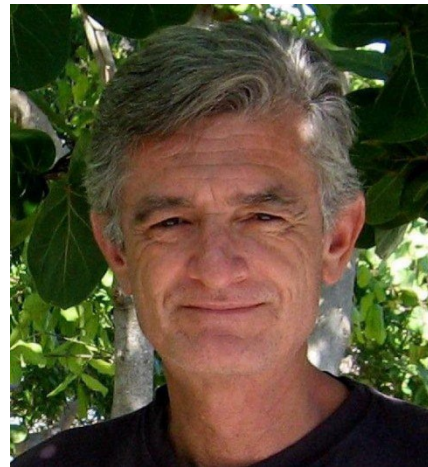
The Newtown Creek Bridge Project envisions a pedestrian bridge at the site of the Old Newtown Trolley Bridge, and would connect Frost Lane in Newtown Borough, with Sycamore Street in Newtown Township. The proposed bridge project will take the same path over the Newtown Creek. The bridge span would be 120 feet in length and 8 feet in width, with paved approaches to the bridge at each end. The historical remnants of the original trolley bridge will be highlighted as part of the project, as its structural condition does not allow it to be incorporated into a design for the pedestrian bridge. Newtown Township, Newtown Borough, and the Newtown Creek Coalition are partners in the planning for the bridge project, and support an application to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for funding.

Stone Abutments of Original Trolley Bridge



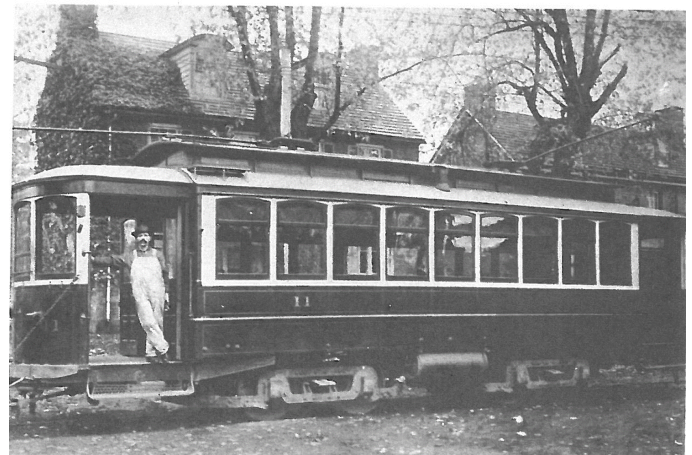

The mission of the Newtown Creek Coalition is: "To improve, protect, and preserve the Newtown Creek, and to encourage appropriate use of this natural and historic resource." Mike has served on Newtown Borough Council, chaired the Borough Planning Commission, and currently serves as the Chairman of the Zoning Hearing Board. He has had a law practice on South State Street in Newtown Borough for many years.

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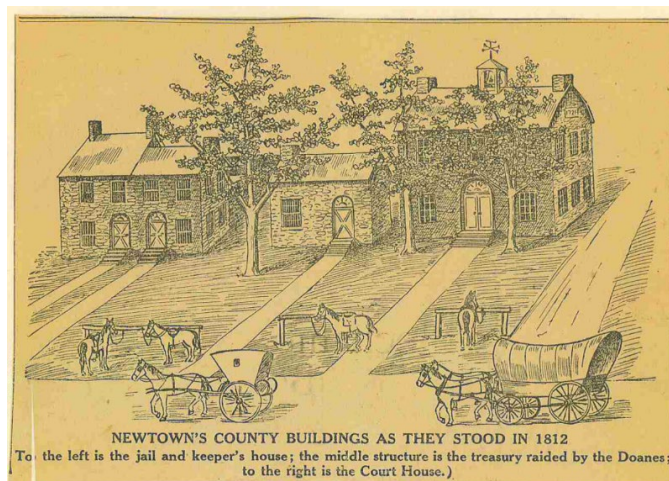

The Doan gang was a group of British loyalists, the most notorious members being five brothers and one cousin from the Doan family of Plumstead. The gang was composed of around 30 members who were accused murderers, attainted traitors, and horse thieves who ferried British prisoners of war to British lines. They were also guilty of robbing tax collectors, their most famous crime being the theft of the Bucks County treasury in 1781. This 45-minute lecture covers the thrilling history of the Doan gang's activities and their frequent visits to colonial taverns in Bucks County. Taverns were the "town halls" of Revolutionary Bucks County. They served not only as a destination for weary travelers but a place to conduct public business such as elections or government meetings, or to record the depositions of victims of the Doan gang's nightly rides.

Proceeds from this event are shared by the NHA and the Newtown Theatre. We expect another sold-out presentation, so be sure to purchase your tickets early on the theatre website. Further details will be made available as the date gets closer.



Newtown Experience® Weekend Update (cont'd)

Then on **Saturday, October 7th**, Newtown Borough will once again be transformed for the public to reminisce about what it was like to eat, shop, and be entertained on the streets of our historic town more than 300 years ago. Our 47th annual Market Day will take place from **10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in and around the Half-moon (Court) Inn at the corner of Court Street and Centre Avenue in Newtown Borough**. This event typically brings close to a thousand people into our town to celebrate our historic past and is free for all to attend.



November General Meeting

How did the arrival of the Europeans impact the peoples of the Northeastern woodlands? Christine Applegate, Educator from the [Museum of Indian Culture](#) will answer this question and more during the November general meeting of the NHA on **Monday, November 20th, 2023, at 7:30 p.m. at the Half-moon (Court) Inn**.

In her presentation, Chris will outline the culture of the people of our area, the Lenape, before and after the arrival of the European colonists. Living in our area for a minimum of 15,000 years (they say they've been here since the beginning), the Lenape took advantage of the natural resources and seasonal changes to build their society. They developed unique styles in housing, clothing, cuisine, and social structure. With the advent of the Fur Trade, new products became available and the relationships among neighboring tribes and the natural world changed. The story of these changes will be told through the use of hands-on examples of food, clothing, tools, furs, and trade goods.

MUSEUM OF INDIAN CULTURE



Founded in 1980 and located in Allentown, PA, the Museum of Indian Culture is a unique member-supported, volunteer run, non-profit resource center for people of all ages to learn about Native American

cultures, especially from the northeast, but also throughout the western hemisphere. Their mission is to preserve and perpetuate the authentic histories and cultural heritage of Native American peoples—past, present, and future. For over 40 years, the museum has offered educational exhibits, programs, internships, and collaborative community events for the greater Lehigh Valley and beyond.

NHA Appoints JHC Liaison

In 1962, the headquarters of George Washington was torn down. Located at South Sycamore Street and Swamp Road, it was the building where he planned the Christmas Day battle of Trenton. This unfortunate event led to the formation of what is today known as the Newtown Historic Association. The mission of the NHA is to preserve and protect Newtown's historic heritage for future generations to enjoy.

To expand its reach, the NHA helped form the Joint Historic Commission (JHC). The JHC is dedicated to protecting and preserving historic and/or architecturally-significant structures in both Newtown Borough and Newtown Township. As such, its membership list is comprised of citizens from both jurisdictions.

The NHA and JHC are distinctly different from the Historic Architectural Review Board (HARB). The Newtown Borough HARB and Newtown Township HARB provide counsel to their respective local government regarding matters that are pertinent to the preservation of the historic aspect and nature of the structures located within their Historic District. Their mission is never ending. While the NHA is not directly involved with either HARB, we fully support their efforts to protect our historic structures.

In a show of support, the NHA has appointed Bill Mahler (a current member of the JHC) as the liaison to the NHA. Bill is a past board member of the NHA, and is knowledgeable and committed to our mission and the community. As our liaison, Bill's primary role will be to keep the NHA informed of upcoming applications (asking permission to demolish all or part of a structure) and the merits of those requests. In turn, the NHA will have the ability to make our members aware of those requests.

The Man Who Built Newtown

Garrett Brown Girton was the most prolific builder in Newtown's Victorian history. Between 1860 and his death in 1913, Girton built over 150 houses, barns, churches, factories, and other structures in and around Newtown. He is buried in the Newtown cemetery.



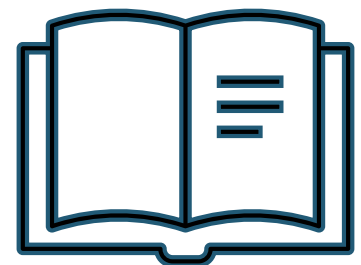
Jeff Marshall, past president of Heritage Conservancy, long-time and active member of the NHA, and current NHA Board member, is writing a book about Girton. The book will have over 150 pages of text and numerous photographs.

One benefactor has already graciously donated \$10,000 towards the publication of the book. Other costs to date have been addressed by volunteers.

Jeff is ready to take the next step with the book, which is to find funding for the editing, layout, and printing costs. He needs additional donations of approximately \$5,000 to \$10,000 to publish the book for the NHA.

Times Have Changed

What can you do with a library card catalog nowadays? Here are a few ideas generated by ChatGPT

(artificial intelligence) about how to repurpose one.
